Dear Mr. Ritenour:

I received the Board Statement in Opposition to Stockholder Proposal on January 2, 2013. I fully respect the board's opinion and the coming shareholders voting result. I will not submit similar proposal again once it is voted.

The statement lists our company's efforts to enhance its human rights policies, but the company refuses independent relevant experts to inspect its practices. For example, our company has invested enormously in my home town Chongqing, which was ruled by the corrupted and criminal Bo Xilai gang for many years. It is natural for me, a concerned shareholder of political refugee, to help our company to verify our company's practices in China in regard of social responsibility before the media (such New York Times' reports on Chinese Premier Wen Jiabao's corruption) or even courts (such as multi cases against Yahoo's so-called Human Rights Fund) revealing any negative hiding agenda. Hiring some dependent firms from irrelevant places (such as in Denmark where no one pays attention to our company's business) to justify our company's human rights policies does not add any legitimacy doing business in China or other repressive countries.

As I have continued helping Cisco after my human rights proposal in its 2010 shareholders meeting, I will also continue to hold our company's shares and am always willing to help our company building the legitimacy doing business in China and the world.
